Dear Members and Friends of the Cathedral, Saint Mary of the Immaculate Conception, and Saint Patrick,

Last week in this space I wrote about the practice of fasting. Now, as we continue to look forward to the coming season of Lent, I'd like to suggest our focus turn to another pillar of that holy season: almsgiving, donating money or goods to the poor and performing other acts of charity. The Catechism of the Catholic Church describes it as "a witness to fraternal charity" and "a work of justice pleasing to God." (no. 2642)

Of the three marks of Lent—prayer, fasting, and almsgiving—I think it is safe to say that almsgiving is the most neglected. And yet, in the Bible when the three are mentioned together, the emphasis is placed on almsgiving: *Prayer and fasting are good, but better than either is almsgiving accompanied by righteousness ... It is better to give alms than to store up gold; for almsgiving saves one from death and expiates every sin. Those who regularly give alms shall enjoy a full life.* (Tobit 12:8–9) Why is almsgiving ranked so highly, because it involves both of the other disciplines: fasting, because it demands sacrificial giving, and prayer, because whatever we do for those in need, we really do for the Lord. (cf. Matthew 25:40)

In the Gospel we will hear on Ash Wednesday, Jesus presumes that his disciples will give alms. He didn't say, IF you give alms, but "WHEN you give alms...." (Matthew 6:2) Driving

the point home about the necessity of giving to those in need, the late Cardinal George, in addressing the major benefactors of the Archdiocese of Chicago, said, "The poor need you to draw them out of poverty, and you need the poor to keep you out of Hell." Like fasting and prayer, almsgiving is a non-negotiable for a healthy spiritual life, and for a fruitful Lent.

In the late fourth century, Saint John Chrysostom, whom I mentioned last week, looked at the good life people were living in the imperial court, and he was filled with righteous anger. In the name of God, he raged against those who owned toilet seats made of gold, while other people starved in cold hovels. While our commodes are made of less precious materials, most people today enjoy a better standard of life than any Byzantine emperor ever knew, and still there are those who need our charity.

As we approach Lent, let us all consider how we can step up our acts of charity to the poor. Opportunities abound like the Rice Bowl which benefits the work of Catholic Relief Services, contributing to the poor boxes which help our Saint Vincent de Paul Society, or volunteering at the Saint Patrick's Center or with the Ministry of Caring. And let's not forget as generous as we are with the Lord, remember he will never be outdone in generosity!

Let's make our plans for Lent now so that we can spend our forty days growing closer to the Lord.
